Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisi-tion from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suf-frage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are or shall be prescribed by law, as fully and effectually as if they were

present at their usual places of election.

Legislature containing more than one sut ject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills.
