2. That a hearty and zealous co-operation of the loyal States with the general government, is essential to the vigorous prosecution of the war, and the speedy and final overthrow of the Rebellion. 3. That in Andrew G. Curtin we

recognize the candidate who will support the government in every measure calculated for the crushing out of this terrible conspiracy against our common country. That we believe that the election of Judge Woodward would tend to embar-

rass the national administration in its policy in prosecuting the war, and would have a moral bearing that would prove disastrous to the cause of the Union, both at home and abroad.

would desire to deprive them of this right. Vote like Sensible Men.

We have been told there are a few men who think of voting against Curtin, solely because they or their friends have been drafted. To such we would say in all sincerity, Curtin is no more at fault for the draft than you are. It is the opposition of such men as Vallandigham and Woodward that causes the necessity for any draft. It was ordered by patriotic men, of both parties, in Congress. It has been executed under Seymour of N. Y. (Dem.) as well as under Curtin of Pa. (Rep.) The Rebels keep up the fight in the hope of the triumph of their friends in the North. De Every vote for Woodward, therefore, only makes another draft more likely. A triumphant majority for Curtin in Pa. and for Brough in Ohio, and another draft may not be required. But "the Union must and shall be preserved," and the hetter the Government is sustained, the fewer will be wounded or killed. the sooner the War will be done, and the less the taxes will be.


