"Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the ambority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suf-frage in all elections by the citizens, under at equally low prices. such regulations as are or shall be prescribed by law, as fully and effectually as if they were
