### "Went Dead."

There is a class of journalists in the Union, who are trying their utmost to be as abusive of the Government as possible, GIRARD HOUSE, and to keep as near the verge of Treason as they can with safety. Some of them are a pecuniary burden to their owners, and anything to make them notorious, is esteemed a god-send. If they can excite soldiers to mob them, and recover damages, it is esteemed a good speculation. And to be taken up by military authority, is the summit of their ambition. 




