#### Soiling Cattle-Horses-Mules.

[Col. A. K. M'CLURE, of the Chambersburg "Repository," seems to be good at almost anything he takes hold of, and is now one of the heavy farmers of Cumberland Valley. In a late number of his paper, under the head of "War's Lessons to Farmers," he objects to restoring the fences taken away by both armies recently. and gives the following good reasons therefor.]

Pasturing our heavy clay lands, is the work of death. If wet and soft, wherever a hoof treads the surface, it bakes, and the air, one of the best of fertilizers, ceases to permeate it. If dry, the tread of stock is almost equally fatal, for it has little or no elasticity; and for all this damage, there is no adequate compensation. We have, for two years, fed all our cattle with excellent grass, from the 10th of June to the 1st of September, cut from the lawn about our dwelling house-in all not over two and a half acres, and a considerable portion of times, for feed—just often enough to keep the lawn neat and clean—and who may have use for a Fodder Cutter. In this way all our cattle have the very best, succulent cattle in the latter part of August and upon its merits for success. No fences are required, no land is damaged, no grass wasted, and the cattle thrive better than in the pasture fields exposed to the heat of summer and tormented by flice. are stabled in the morning, before the heat of the day, the stable kept dark to exclude flies, although well ventilated, and in the evening, they are turned out and fed in the yard and have free range to running water. Thus two acres of farm land, besides the lawn about my house, supply all the pasture for our cattle five months of the year, while most of our neighbors would destroy fifteen acres of grass, not to count fences and damage to land, in keeping the same number, and then would have good pasture

We never pasture horses. They do immense damage to land, and often are more injured than benefitted cery store in Lewisburg, where a sample by grazing. They are better in the stable, with good grass cut for them when it is fit for use ; and when it is not-when young clover is mixed with it-they are better

We have thus digressed to enforce our conviction that inside fences are needless, profitless and positively wasteful of land, of labor and of money ; and we entreat such of our farm ers as have lost fences, to learn the lesson of war, and take out all remaining inside fences and make outside fences in the best style. No farmer has yet, so far as we have been advised, tried soiling stock, and returned to the old plan; and we feel well assured that no farmer will ever return to division fences after he has fairly tried getting along without

Another lesson clearly taught by the sad events of the last year, is the necessity of employing mules more generally in our farming operations. They are capable of doing as much ordinary farm work as the horse, are ten-fold more enduring, are never sick and rarely crippled by sprains or other accidents, they live twice as long as the horse, and can be kept on one half the feed from year to year.
