Yesterday closed the Ladies' fair and Bazzar in this place, for the benefit of the soldiers' families. It was open day and night from Christmas eve, and attended by thousands. The large Hall, consisting of seventeen unfinished rooms of the third storey of the Beckel Building, with a Mar. twenty foot ball or entry, were crowded full, so much so at times that it was diffi cult to pass to and fro. The rooms or booths were grand, and tastefully decorated, and furnished with the very best of furniture, pictures, curtains, &c., that could be found in the best of parlors in the May. city. Each booth had a stove or fire place, and, filled with goods and merchandize, the occupants being clad in different national costumes, (Turkish, Chinese. Japanese, French, Dutch, Yankee, Quaker, Gipsey, &c.,) made all exceedingly rich and attractive. There was a splendid dining ball, where the best the market could afford was provided. Every store, shop or manufactory was represented in some kind of goods, machinery or implements. The whole, including the provisions for the tables, was denated to the Fair and Bazzar by the citizens of the town and country, and all offered for sale. mostly by chance prices, the balance by auction, yielding between \$15,000 and \$20,000. The citizens never enjoyed a more pleasant holiday festival, as the entire town and country took the most lively interest in it. Every congregation, demomination and association, high and low, rich and poor were engaged, (except the Catholies, and most rabid Vallandighamites ; the latter "would not furnish a man or a dollar.")
