BALTIMORE, March 10 -Maj Harry White is among the released prisoners returned by the rebels to Gen. Butler's Department.

The exchange of prisoners is going on estisfactorily under the superintendence of Gen. Butler. Over 600 privates and 48 officers were delivared to him from Rich-

Col Dablgreep, one of the bravest of the late excursion to Richmond, it is stated on what appears reliable authority. was killed in a skirmish at King and Queen Court House, last Priday. He was a son of Admiral Dablgreen.

An official dispatch from Col. Mulligan, dated at New Creek, Va , on March 2d, says : Ninety-four deserters and conscripts armed have just come in from the neighborhood of Staunton. They report that on the 20th of last month 110 deserters and conscripts left Mr. Salen, in Augusta county, armed and resolved to fight their way through to our lines.

CINCINNATI, March 9 .- Passengers by the steamer Luminary, from Vicksburg on the 3d inst., say that Sherman and his army are there. He has destroyed forage ton Cir. J C Farnsworth. Middle Creek Cir. and provisions enough to subsist the rebel army from three to six months. In one place be destroyed over \$2,000,000 of others, J Bowersoz. Boalsburg Cir, M Zu. property, and at another place immense stores and thousands of bushels of wheat were consumed. He brought in l droves of cattle, several thousand head of mules, eight thousand pegroes and over four thousand prisoners, with trifling loss of men and material on our side. In addition to this, by the destruction of every important railroad line, Gen. Sherman bas released Gen. M'Pherson's corps from guard duty along the Mississippi, and estored him to active service. Gen. Grant, when on his way east, expressed himself entirely satisfied with the situation of military affaire, and spoke in the highest terms of General Sherman's expedition, which had given the rebellion the severest blow since the fall of Vicksburg. Rebel rumors say that Col. Forrest was killed in as engagement with this expedition.
