We understand that the recruiting officers throughout the State have been called in.
The remains of G. W. Traitt, who was drowned last week, were sent home for interment.

Gen. Burdette wants to mount a regiment of Cavalry immediately, and he has not horses enough. Persons who can spare suitable horses have now an opportunity to dispose of them at high prices for a good cause.

Two Farmers' Propositions.
In the Senate of Pennsylvania, a petition was recently presented from the Agricultural Society of Adams county. They argue that--
Most sections of our country are suffering in beauty, climate, and health, from the too great destruction of forest timber.

Col. John H. Stover is the recipient of a splendid sword, presented to him by Capt. M. P. Tomlinson, by whom it was captured from the Rebels, near Richmond, 15th June, 1862. Capt. Tomlinson has since enlisted under Col. Stover.

The bill has passed both Houses, altering the long name of the "Times Saving Institution of Lewisburg, to that of "Lewisburg Deposit Bank," and to increase their capital from thirty to sixty thousand dollars. The Governor has signed the bill, and it is a law.

The House has been long passing the Appropriation Bill. The Cops have been systematically voting--almost unanimously--for the very highest appropriations, increasing salaries, &c., and a few Philadelphians of our own party helped them through in some cases, but not in all.

FIFTY DOLLARS REWARD--A little son of Charles B. Davis, of Williamsport, aged about three years, was drowned in the river at that place, on Tuesday, the 12th inst., and the reward will be given for the recovery of the body. At the time of drowning he was dressed in a suit of dark plaid.

THE GREAT CENTRAL FAIR.

Agreeably to a request from Alfred L. Kennedy, Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture, I appointed a county committee, whose names appeared in the "Chronicle" of the 12th inst., who have appointed the following Borough, Ward and Township Committees, to solicit their contributions of the fair and the Farmers' household, to be exhibited and disposed of at the Fair to be held as aforesaid.

It is not intended that the contributions should be confined exclusively to farmers. The merchant, manufacturer, mechanic, architect, and all other professions are expected to make contributions.

Among our dead officers are Capt. Bradford, Lieut. Burr, Ackerstrom, Wilson and Major Booth, all of the 13th Tennessee Cavalry. Capt. Paston, Lieut. Lyon, 10th Tennessee, and Capt. Young, 24th Missouri, acting Provost Marshal, were taken prisoners. Major Bradford was also taken, but it is said to have escaped. It is feared, however, that he has been killed.

Col. Reed Aug., of the Tennessee regiment, was mortally wounded.
Two negro soldiers, who were wounded at Fort Pillow and buried by the rebels, afterwards worked themselves out of their graves, and are among those brought up on the Platte Valley. They are now in the hospital at Mound City.

An unpleasant development was made in Cincinnati the other day concerning Catawba brandy. Responsible witnesses declared that the pure article would cost from five to eight dollars a gallon, adding that there was no genuine article of the kind in the market--the quality generally sold consisting of pomace, whiskey, and fave oil.

A woman has been arrested at Woolwich, England, for marrying five husbands. When informed of the many proofs of her delinquencies, she replied, "That when she had done her bit of imprisonment she had no fear of getting another husband or two to comfort her."

Massacre at Fort Pillow!

CAIRO, April 11.--On Tuesday morning, with some 6,000 men, attack on Fort Pillow. Soon after the attack Fort Pillow was taken, and the rebels set a flag of truce, demanding the surrender of the fort and garrison, in the meanwhile disposing his forces so as to gain an advantage.

Both flags gave the rebels the advantage of gaining new positions.
The battle was kept up until 3 o'clock, P. M., when Major Booth was killed and Maj. Bradford took command. The rebels came in swarms over our troops, compelling their surrender.
