Having determined to use the negro as a soldier, there is no given to any other soldier. The difficulty is not in stating the principle, but in practically applying it. It is a mistake to suppose the Government is indifferent to this matter, or is not doing the best it can in regard to it. We do not to day know that a colored soldier, or white officer commanding colored soldiers, has been massacred by the Rebels when made a prisoner. We fear it, believe it, I may say, but we do not know. To take the life of one of their prisoners on the assumption that they murder ours, when it is short of certainty that they do murmistake.
