Tea and coffee are luxuries merely, unknown for thousands of years; they are no necessity, only as custom has made them seem so. A few years ago, the ebildren now demand their daily drams ! The man who imbibes intoxicating drinks, the biped tobacco worm, the spuff taker, the opium eater-all these need them just as much as you need to indulge the cravings of an artificial appetite-no more.

"O, you don't compare my coffee drink to that of the intoxicating bowl?" Not exactly—the latter is in all respects much the worse-but both are alike unnecessary and expensive and tend to injure health. Your coffee and tea cost pr year say \$25.00 Sugar for same

Total for a doubtful luxury \$60.00 There are sixty dollars gone for what cold water would have done as well-and that sixty would have gone far towards rent, or for plain wholesome food, or for clothing for yourself and little ones.

"But then I feel so much better after a good strong cup." And you want it to be stronger and stronger year by year, den't you? There is a temporary stimulation or excitement, often mistaken for strength or nourishment. If there be a peculiar, subtle, beneficial power (which I doubt) in these beverages, it is much less than in ordinary articles of food. Thousands of individuals, once devoted to rum, opium or tobacco, have thought they could not abandon them, and yet they have done so and-after a long, hard trial, perhapsbave found great pecuniary and healthful advantage in the change.
