The Fishing Creek Rebellion.

The Whiskey Insurrection of West Pennsylvania—Shay's, Barr's, Durr's, and John Brown's rebellions—and the "independent governments" of Wyoming, of Faulkland, South Carolina, and of Utah, all came to naught; they were "recoiled" into "submissions" by the "strong hand" of the National Government.

Mr. Harris, of Maryland, denounced Gen. McClellan as a hireling tool of the Administration, the man who arbitrarily arrested the Maryland Legislature.

Mr. Carrigan called Mr. Harris to order for his violent assaults upon McClellan. The President decided Harris out of order, and that put an end to "Free Speech" in the caucus.

Mr. Long, of Ohio, said McClellan had gone farther than Lincoln in the perpetration of tyrannical measures upon the sacred privileges and rights of the people.

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Copperhead Caucus at Chicago.

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Important Law.

An Act for the protection of Volunteers against Frauds in the payment of Bounty Money.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted, &c. That any person who may be entranced with any bounty money for any Pennsylvania volunteer entering the service of the United States or this State, who shall, with or without the consent of such volunteer, retain the same or any part thereof, or shall fail to pay to such volunteer, at the time of his being mustered in, the full amount of such bounty money, without any deduction or abatement, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, in any court of oyer and terminer or quarter sessions, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of five hundred dollars, and to be imprisoned at hard labor in the Penitentiary for the term of six months.

Approved by the Governor, Aug 24, '64.

In Ohio, a man who (with his ancestors for several generations) had been sold against his consent, and compelled to toil for just what his purchaser chose to give him, put himself on the block, and offered to go and shoot Rebels for the man who would give him the most compensation.

The Chambersburg Repository contains a narrative in detail of Rebel deeds in that unfortunate town on the occasion of its destruction. We extract a portion of a paragraph for the benefit of those in this vicinity who have been apologizing for the rebel barbarities on the ground of a just retaliation.

The house of Mr. James Watson—an old and feeble man of over eighty, was entered, and because his wife earnestly remonstrated against the turning they fired the room, hurled her into it and locked the door on the outside.

The surrender of Fort Morgan is fully confirmed. It capitulated after a bombardment of five days. The commander, Gen. Page, with 600 prisoners, sixty pieces of artillery, all the stores, ammunition, &c., were handed over to Admiral Farragut and Gen. Granger.

The Rebels grieve over the loss of the Weldon Railroad. It appears to have touched them on a very sensitive spot, by cutting off a great portion of their supplies. The unbroken communications to Richmond are over taxed in carrying provisions to that beleaguered city.
