Slavery has shown irself to be utterly incompatible with peace and good order. It is seen, by all intelligent men, to be the dark source of perpetual war. Slavery is war, a d withing else. To hold millions of men in bindage by brute force, what is that but

Noble, peaceful, German Baprists! now is your time! Without violence, without bloodshed, without one unholy thought, without one unlawful act, by peaceful means, you can now help to dry up one great fountain of ever asting war.

Let me call your attention to one important fact. The Senate of Pennsylvania is about equally divided between the two great parties. The loss of one mem-ber, by the friends of Freedom, might give the control of that important body to the Pro-Slavery sympathizers with Rebellion; and thus secure the election of a United States Senator, in spirit like the infamous Vallandigham, who would glory in crushing down to the condition o brutes, men made in the image of God! Can you consent to this? Can you let this come to pass, when, perhaps, your single vote might, under God, prevent this great, disgraceful calamity?

Christian men! hear me, not for my-self, but for my cause!
