What Shall the End Be?

That a people as mad as those who have established the Southern Confederacy will ever be to establish such a system as this for an indefinite time is beyond question.

The National Intelligencer raises the question whether Alabama can wholly secede from the Union and adopt a new revenue system, even on the supposition that the general government shall not coerce them. Already they are greatly exhausted; their resources are limited; their bondholders would gladly exchange creditors. Perhaps they had better give up the idea of independence, and their credit both at home and abroad is ruined.

These Southern states already ex-

plained, their social system is shaking to its foundations. Families are flying to the North in search of an asylum from the tempest, and the whole secession section is fast running under the weight of a lawless mob. But, more fearfully than all, they stand in hourly jeopardy of a servile insurrection; for it is contrary to the experience to say that a lawless multitude, armed with muskets, bayonets, and sabres, and the blood remains unaffected by it. All the bonds that held that heterogeneous community together must snap, sooner or later, since they have, by their own art, broken their greatest and most sacred political tie.

Thus are they exposed to the most terrible calamities that ever befell a whole people.

The result will probably be, first, a complete separation of the slaves from the master class.

Secondly, a period of confusion, misery, and rapine, to be succeeded in time by a reconstruction of society, from which both slavery and the African population will escape.

Parading men have long predicted an exodus of the colored people of this country to a more southern and congenial region; and this becomes more probable every day.

To be compelled to maintain slavery in a com-

munity cowed and disorganized as is the case now.

Already the slaves are a terror to their owners; and as the rule of lawlessness on the part of the poor and ignorant whites, who have been armed against the general government, gains force, the hold of the master upon his slaves weakens.

That condition of things, therefore, is likely to be followed by a terrible ordeal; but it effects like those of other storms, will probably purify and fit it for an era of moral and material advancement impossible in its present social condition. It is, to be sure, a fearful thing to me a whole people given over to madness and self-destruction; but we may confidently trust that a kind Providence will interpose at the proper time and set them right again.

Mr. CLAYMORE SPENCER.—The speech of Mr. Claymore, of the Wheling district, of the House, on Wednesday, is a lesson of very high interest to the Eastern people. It is a speech of two hours.

Mr. CLAYMORE is a Southern man, identified with all the interests of the South; a Western Virginian; as the custodian of those who were not of our country, he was now riding on the crest of the popular wave, but who through his efforts to do so infamously that no noble could over ride him toward the goal where he was headed.

He has come among Pennsylvaniaans, who had instigated the revolution which was

carried on by the author of the Constitution.

Gov. Curtin will, I am sure, make good his promise to reward him.
