Most Southern politicians and writers in Southern newspapers, (we need not say pro-slavery, for that to others could find fault in the South) have been the habit of boasting of their ability to obtain the recognition of Great Britain, France, and the other European Powers, at any time they were ready to give a government of their own. Now that they have at length ventured to make that attempt, we shall look with great interest, of course, for the developments of that diplomacy and their independent national policy, and the governments of Europe.
