CITY AFFAIRS

Metropolitan Commission for the Study of the City of Pittsburgh
The Metropolitan Commission for the Study of the City of Pittsburgh, organized by Act of March 21, 1934, reported its findings to the City Council on April 4. The commission, headed by Mayor E. A. Martini, recommended a number of changes to the city government, including the consolidation of the various departments and the creation of a new executive body.

Missouri and Virginia Money Taken

AT CHARLES GIBNER'S, No. 78 Market Street.
A large amount of money, believed to be the proceeds of a robbery in Missouri, was taken from a safe at the residence of Charles Gibner, 78 Market Street, on April 4. The money was hidden in a safe in the basement of the building and was worth approximately \$10,000.

City Council Session

The City Council met in session on April 4, 1934, at 10 o'clock in the morning. Mayor E. A. Martini presided over the session. The council heard reports from various departments and considered several pieces of legislation, including a resolution regarding the city's financial affairs.

Police Department

The Pittsburgh Police Department reported several arrests on April 4.
