HARPER'S FERRY BETRAYED. Sloop of War Yorktown Seized. VIRGINIA AN ARMED NEUTRAL. 10,000 VOLUNTEERS FROM INDIANA.

Harper's Ferry, Md., April 18.—The sloop of war Yorktown, commanded by Captain M. B. Davis, was seized by the rebels of Harper's Ferry.

Virginia has declared herself an armed neutral, and has refused to allow the passage of federal troops through her territory.

Ten thousand volunteers from Indiana have been organized for the purpose of joining the federal army.
