RELIGIOUS INTELLIGENCE.

The fourth annual meeting of the Pennsylvania Bible Society was held at Harrisburg, Wednesday last week. On the previous evening the 30th ult., the annual dinner was delivered by the Rev. Dr. Krauth, of Philadelphia, formerly pastor of the Lutheran church of this city, in the First Presbyterian church. Wednesday morning a number of delegates from different parts of the State convened in the above mentioned church.

The convention was organized by the appointment of Rev. Dr. Loyal Young, of Butler Co., chairman. The session was opened with voluntary remarks from the delegates relative to the success attending the dissemination of the Holy Scriptures. In the afternoon, the reports of delegates were resumed, but most of the session was occupied by the discussion of a series of resolutions reported by the business committee.

We condone: First resolution refers to the usefulness of the Bible Society in being able to supply large bodies of volunteer troops and the community at large, with the sacred treasure.

The second recommends systematic and vigorous action throughout the State, and for each church to have a yearly collection for the cause, a thorough exploration of each district.

The third is to the effect that the society should be organized in every county.

Fourth and fifth suggest the formation of Pennsylvania Bible Societies in all the counties and under the management of the Church, and lately owned by Berkshires, Kiefer and Casper, thence north two deg. west fifth longitude; to land now owned by W. H. Stewart, of Cincinnati; thence south 88 deg. west 128 acres to land now or lately owned by George Foster; thence south 2 deg. east 138 acres to places of beginning, containing four acres more or less, on which is erected a log dwelling house, stable and other outbuildings.

The sixth is to the effect that the organization of Bible Societies in our institutions of learning are approved and recommended in the sixth of the series. The last refers to the appointment of a Committee of nine to prepare and issue an address to the people of Pennsylvania on behalf of the interests of the Bible cause. In the evening the anniversary meeting of the Society took place.

Bishop Domenech of the Diocese (Catholico) of Pittsburgh, a lecture on the "Spanish Inquisition," delivered at Altoona, Pa., is reported to have said that the Inquisition was justifiable in itself, and that the abuses which followed it were brought about by the German Catholic Church, and not by the Spanish.

The Bishop, according to the report, is moving, and will be opposed to, a re-establishment of the Inquisition in our country.

From letters received by Bishop Payne of the African M. E. Church, we learn, says the "American Presbyterian," that a glorious revival is in progress at Wilberforce University, located near Xenia, Ohio. This institution has one hundred pupils in attendance—a larger number than at any previous season.

The Emperor of Austria recently signed a patent law, for Protestants in the Slavo-German Provinces granting independence in religion and education; the right to build churches and acquire property. The subject of marriage, for the present, to be treated in accordance with the laws of civil code. The law is regarded as liberal.

The "Freebeytani Banner" gives the names of three ministers who are captains of volunteer companies to resist the authority of the Federal Government.

The anniversary of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church was held in Dr. Stet's Hall, New York city, on Sabbath evening. From the annual report we extract the following:

The staff of laborers consist of 8 ordained ministers, of whom 6 are natives of the countries in which they are employed, 11 laymen, 20 native school teachers, catechists and Scripture readers; in the churches under the care of these missionaries over 2,600 communicants have been gathered, by the means of 100 converts to the faith, and in the mission schools over 4,300 scholars are daily learning the Christian lesson. The return of the European laborers are not included.

The receipts for the year were \$211,108.41, including \$211,060.03 in interest, and the sum of \$28.33, a portion of the cost of its meeting, the Rev. Dr. Green delivered an eloquent discourse on the text—Ita illa est.

The Right Reverend Benj. T. Onderdonk, Bishop of the Diocese of New York, Protestant Episcopal Church, died in New York city on Tuesday of last week, of water on the brain, in the seventy-second year of his age. The funeral obsequies, celebrated at Trinity church, were the most solemn and impressive character. The interior of the venerable edifice was suitably draped—charter's stand, baptismal font, pulpit, altar and organ—for the occasion in the habitments of woe. As the procession entered the church under the lead of clergymen, the service of the Episcopal Church was chanted—the entire exercises being choral. The Rev. Dr. Onderdonk, the author and pastor, was buried in the cemetery of the diocese.

He took his seat in the pulpit of the old St. George's, at the suit of George Harvey.

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
