The telegraph yesterday morning brought the intelligence of the death of the Hon. Braxton A. Bragg, who expired at about nine o'clock yesterday morning at his residence at Chicago.

Bragg was a native of Virginia, and was born in 1792. He was a member of the Virginia Convention of 1829, and was elected to the office of Governor of that State in 1836.

Bragg was a distinguished military officer, and was prominent in the Southern cause during the late war. He was defeated at the battle of Gettysburg, and fled to the mountains of North Carolina.

Bragg was a man of high character, and was respected by all who knew him. He was a devoted patriot, and was ever ready to sacrifice for the cause of his country.
