All Quiet at Munson's Hill.

At sundown the rebel troops at Munson's Hill were quiet. No guns can be seen; though it is inferred that they are mounted behind their intrenchments, through which embrasures will doubtless be made when an action is had. Gen. McClellan was promptly on hand when the light commenced to-day, and all the troops were under arms.
