RELIGIOUS INTELLIGENCE.

The European Correspondent of the Presbyterian writes that the Irish Presbyterian Church is in a more satisfactory condition than in any former period of its history.

Abundant fruits have followed from the great exertions of 1860, in the decline of temperance, in increase of public worship, in the attendance at public meetings, in general observance of family worship, and a revival of the good old plan of catechizing on the Sabbath evening.

There is an increased demand for religious publications; in the provision being carried out with a new work of colportage in part, and in a growing disposition to speak and read on spiritual subjects, the seasons of preparation of the truth, and in enlarged meetings of prayer meetings.

Theological Seminary of the Reformed Dutch Church at New Brunswick, N. J., has fifty-three students.

According to the Lutheran papers the several schools of that church differ very widely in their views of doctrinal points.

It is proposed to have a more complete organization of the American Reformation of the Augsburg Confession, or some other basis, if possible more acceptable.
