LATEST FROM YORKTOWN.

A gentleman direct from Yorktown informs me that at five o'clock last evening a large portion of Gen. McGlellan's army had advanced and were closely following up the enemy. In Yorktown a number of dead bodies were found, including several officers, who were killed during the cannonading on Saturday night and Sanday morning, a brisk fire being keptup the whole night. The rebels kept their guus manned throughout the night, and the rear guard abandoned them at daylight on Sunday, when our columns advanced and took possession, the cavairy and artillery following rapidly after them. From the cannonading throughout the afternoon and evening, there is no doubt that there was some serious fighting with their rear guard.
