The New Engagement near Fort

Wright's—The naval engagement at

the Pointe aux Cheneaux on Lake Huron.

Cairo, May 13.—In the naval engagement

at the Pointe aux Cheneaux, Fort

Wright, on the Misisipi, the greatest

damage was more seriously damaged by

the frequent buttins that received from the rebel

gunboat, than by the shells fired by the

Union gunboat.

The federal gunboat Mount City did ex-

cellent service during the engagement, and

was the only vessel that received no damage.

It was run into shallow water, where it settled to

the bottom. She has been pulled out and

are now being repaired at the Pointe aux Cheneaux.

During the heat of the engagement, one

rebel gunboat had got hold of her bow.

The Monitor and Nantucket Gone

Fortress Monroe, May 12.—The rebel

steamer Curtis Pack and the

Richmond this morning at daylight, having

on board 1,000 men, were sent to the

Monterey and Nantucket were passed by them

beyond the City Point, steaming up towards

the James River, where they would

reach Roanoke Roads during the evening.

The iron clad steamer Galena, which went up

the James River, was stopped, and was

steaming on after the Nantucket and Monitor towards Richmond.

They had been fired upon by some of the bat-

tleship, and were scattered, and then passed,

leaving them to the most insignificant

to stop for their impudence. Their shots were, of course, harmless, on the

water, and the rebels had no time to return.

The Monitor, however, had appeared off

Douglas Island.

The New Orleans, May 14.—The rebels

had a special dispatch from Monterey, Tenn., dated

13th inst. It says we to-day took possession

of the deserted rebel camp, three miles and a

half west of Corinth, and the rebels fled.

The Mobile Register of May 1st, states

that the Union garrison had appeared off

Hopkins Island.

The New Orleans of the 4th instant, ran into the river below New Orleans, and
