Forgery of Bank of England Notes. their great protection against the ingenuity of the forger has been the peculiarity in the manufacture of their paper—a peculiarity which has hitherto defied imitation. Various as have been the attempts to imitate this paper, it has never been successful, for a spurious Bank of England note could always be detected by the quality of the paper alone—that is, detected by all who are accustomed to the handling of the notes. Finding that they could not successfully make this paper, the forgers have had recourse to a more simple mode of procuring it—they have stolen a large quantity, some say several tous, from the Bank's their great protection against the ingenuity mills, and there is great consternation in Threadneedle sireet. The robbery was only brought to light by the great number of forged notes in circulation, which are so like the real thing that the most exper-

like the real thing that the most experienced in such matters have been imposed upon, even practised dashiers and others long accustomed to the handling of notes. When the painful fact was satisfactorily established, the Bank Directors immediately issued a reward of £1,500 for the discovery of the thieves and forgers, of which £500 is to be paid for the detection of the paper-stealers, and £1,000 to those who can trace out the persons using the paper in the printing of forged notes. Bankers, money-changers, and others are urged in the same announcement to exercise the utmost vigilance in the receiving of Bank of England notes, and are requested to note the name and address of the persons from the name and address of the persons fro whom they receive them.
