

A Startling Revelation.

We give up a considerable portion of our space today for the purpose of laying before our readers, in extenso, the letter of Lord Lyons, the British Minister at Washington, to Lord John Russell, disclosing the intrigues of the democratic party, as he calls them, "conservative" politicians with him, in order to bring about foreign intervention, so as to put a stop to the war, and save the South from emancipation. It is a very remarkable and important document, and proves what we have often said, that the leaders of that party have been and are still laboring to betray the country into the hands of rebel enemies. The British Parliament, in calling for and giving publicity to this letter, together with others, has perhaps indirectly, rendered the Government of the United States a very important service. We now know, by authority that cannot be disputed, the true purpose of the "democratic" party, and what we know how much value to attach to their professions in favor of the vigorous prosecution of the war. We now know the secret of Gen. McClellan's popularity with that portion of our population, and that they used him as their instrument to wear the country out. Lord Lyons tells us how they were discovered, and that they were, who dressed themselves up as a desire for peace, and who took good care never to win one.

But we have said more than we intended when we began; our main object being to let our readers not merely read this letter, but to study it carefully, and we think they will be convinced that the enemies that the Government has had to contend with in the year have been more formidable than could be known in front.

Could those politicians, of whom Lord Lyons speaks, be identified, they could be tried, convicted and subjected to ignominious penalties, under the law of 1799, enacted for the punishment of those who "swayed on any intercourse with the agent of any foreign government," with a view to "defeat the measures of the Government of the United States."

A letter from Lord Lyons on Our "Conservatives."—His View of the Situation Five Months ago.

WASHINGTON, 11th April, 1862. My Lord—In his despatches of the 17th and 21st ult., and of the 7th inst., Mr. Russell reported to your Majesty the election for members of Congress and State Legislatures, which were generally in favor of the Union. Without repeating the details, it will be sufficient for me to observe that the success of the Democratic party, has been so great among the most important States of the Union, that it has become a serious matter to maintain the right and the most complete that has ever been witnessed, even in this country.

It was not until New York on the 8th inst. I found the conservative leaders availing themselves of the prevailing panic by the party in their States. They appeared to be alarmed at the prospect of the Democratic party, and in the conviction that personal liberty and freedom of speech had been secured for the principal States of the Union, they believed that the government must at once desert from the Union, and that the people of the South, and recognize the idea of seceding from the Union.

On the following morning, however, intelligence arrived from Washington which dashed all these hopes of the "Conservatives." It was announced that General McClellan had been dismissed from the command of the Army of the Potomac, and ordered to repair to his home; that he had in fact, been removed from his command, and that the Government had been regarded as the representative of conservative principles in the army. Supporters of him had been the chief of the articles of the extreme radical party, and that the attempt to carry out the policy of that party would be resisted in the Union. I gave no opinion on the subject. I did not say whether or not I myself thought foreign intervention probable or advisable; but I hinted at the possibility of such an event, and the plan and hope of the conservative party. At the present moment, therefore, the chiefs of the conservative party will loudly for a more vigorous prosecution of the war, and represent the government with slackness as well as the most of nations in military matters. But they repudiate all idea of interfering with the institutions of the Southern States, or of meeting any objection or extermination. They maintain that the object of the military operations should be to bring the South to a position to demand an armistice with honor and with effect. The armistice should (they hold) be followed by a convention, in which such changes of the Constitution should be proposed as would give the South a majority in the Senate, and share property, and would enable the North to do the South to remain and to live together in peace and harmony. The conservative promises to think that the South might be induced to take part in such a convention, and that a restoration of the Union would be the result. The more sagacious members of the party must, however, look upon the prospect of a convention merely as a last experiment to test the possibility of a restoration. They are, so to speak, well aware that the more probable alternative of an armistice would be the abandonment of the Southern States altogether; and that if the South is not utterly abandoned that no further concessions will be made to it, and that it will be left to its fate.

It is with reference to such an armistice as they desire to attain that the leaders of the conservative party regard the question of foreign intervention. They think that the offer of mediation if made to a radical administration, would be rejected; that if made to an unprincipled administration, it might increase the
