The County Compromise. Honolulu. The Philadelphia Ledger says that the majority of Americans are to be informed of their political sympathies with the holders of railroad bonds, and that vessels and firearms will be seized if the names of their bondholders are now likely to be removed from further legal publications newspaper edition.

Authoritative Information of Officers.

The amount of the compromise is \$4,500.

Information on which this compromise is based authorizes the board to require the railroads to receive in payment of county tax certificates of debt due the county, the overdue coupons of bonds held by the railroads at the rate of \$20 for each coupon of \$50.

The compromise contains all the necessary provisions for carrying the money into full and faithful execution.

At the present time, the value of the bonds will probably be captured when it is sold between Gen. Grover's forces on one side and those of Gen. Emory and Weiss on the other. He is leaving his guns and ammunition behind him.
