Death of Col. John Heron. We are pleased to announce the death of Col. John Heron, one of the oldest citizens of Allegheny county. He expired at his residence in Meersville, this morning, at half past three o'clock, at the advanced age of seventy-two years.

Arrival of Major Showalter's Command. The Sixth Virginia Regiment, under command of Major Showalter, numbering about six hundred men, arrived in this city on Friday night from Uniontown. The regiment had been stationed at Uniontown, Pa., and then the enemy attacked that place on Sunday last, they made a gallant defense, driving back the rebels with a reported loss of twenty men killed. After being repulsed, the enemy retired in larger force, compelling our little garrison to abandon the post and to leave in such haste that they could not remove the ammunition, but they took the powder and the cartridges in their pockets.

Sentences in the Criminal Court. Judge Robinson, convicted of the larceny of a sum of money from Stewart Spang, was sentenced to three months in the county jail to date from April 1st.

News from the Border. The ten o'clock train from Uniontown brought no additional intelligence concerning the rebel movements on the border and the operations about Morgantown are still shrouded in mystery.
