The Union Convention.

A telegram from Harrisburg, in the Gazette of yesterday morning, stated that it is probable that the Union State Convention, which was expected to be held in this city on the 1st day of July, will be postponed to a future date, on account of the trouble arising from the invasion of the State by the rebels.

The invasion excitement in Harrisburg is still very high. The Baltimore American, of Monday, gives us some information about the preparations made there to meet a rebel attack. Our citizens will like to compare notes with Baltimore on this interesting subject.

Saturday and Sunday were two days of unrepresented excitement in and around Baltimore. Gen. Sherman has been using great energy to place the city in a state of defense, and has met with the hearty cooperation of its citizens, at least to the extent of whom he has been furnished with arms, and are organized in companies, prepared to meet the city from the rebel invasion.

As to the designs of the rebel General, none of his movements reported since our last, seem to throw any clearer light upon them. One of our contemporaries makes the following judicious remarks on this subject:
'It is not probable that Lee has moved to the Shenandoah valley, as he has not the army and to harvest the crops on the Shenandoah, so that he will be content with the settlements made by his advance and detached columns. Though the vigilance and activity of Hooker's army have foiled the rebel attempt at Washington, the front and have postponed any immediate attempt, it is very certain that Lee will not abandon the object for which he has this northward expedition without the effort to accomplish it in part or in whole, and it becomes of the greatest importance to watch his movements and to penetrate his mysterious designs. That he has a grand scheme of invasion on hand is evident, and it remains to be seen whether Baltimore, Harrisburg or Pittsburgh is to be the end and aim of his march.

We have been taught by experience that when Lee's pickets along our front in the strongest, when the marching and evolutions of his army are most conspicuous, and when the smoke of his camp fires is least expected, he is engaged in developing some masterly stratagem, or cover of which he is very sure to 'turn up' some least expected. Just as the business along all his outposts—bridges destroyed, West to Cumberland, cavalry cutting East in the Shenandoah valley, and terror-inspiring raids all across his Northern front. It is just possible that these are movements on the part of Lee, to conceal the more rapid motion of the 'hub,' and that while we are amused or alarmed by Pleasanton or Jackson, the bulk of the rebel army is slowly being transported across the Potomac and taking up position in new camps, where a thorough system of invasion can be organized. The first wild rumors a week ago placed a large force of Lee's army in the Shenandoah valley, and a few thousand men, and this again has by very accurate reports, and an invading force, which is massed in several places, the whole forming a cordon of outposts, preventing the escape of information, and enclosing a large field in which severe preparations may be made for a vigorous campaign. Slowly and surely he would seem to be throwing his army upon his new bases of operations. By lives and tens of thousands, and with little perceptible noise it may be rolled across the river, there launched into a solid body, and suddenly transported into Pennsylvania or Baltimore. His very rapid and unexpectedness would give it a terrible momentum and render more difficult the task of checking it.

It is obviously the duty of the North, if such be Lee's plan, and indeed if Lee had no such plan, that the duty would be equally imperative, to effect a thorough organization of its militia and home reserves. A young man from this city, traveling through the West, was at one time in Ohio, and attended a Union meeting held in one

of the large cities of that state, and among the speakers recognized, in the most ardent of them all, an Englishman who had formerly been a teacher in one of the ward schools up town. At the close of the speech the young man approached his former friend, calling him by his old name. The name was distinctly by the Union orator, and his acquaintance with the young man shrank at once. But the New Yorker could not be shaken off so easily. He pressed his inquiries until he succeeded in making himself feared, if not recognized, by the Union speaker.
