The United States of America and the Republic of Liberia, desiring to fix, in a permanent and equitable manner, the rules to be observed in the intercourse and commerce they desire to establish between their respective countries, have agreed, for this purpose, to conclude a treaty of commerce and navigation; and have judged that the said and cannot be better obtained than by taking the most perfect equality and resiprocity for the basis of their agreement; and to affect this they have named as their respective Pienipotentiaries, that is to say the President of the United States of America, Charles Francis Adams, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Pienipotentiary of the United States of America at the Court of St. James; and the Republic of Liberia, his Excellency Stephen Allan Benson, President thereof, who after having communicated to each others. lie of Liberts, as Allen Benson, President thereof, who Allen Benson, President thereof, who after having communicated to each other their respective full powers; found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following articles:

any other foreigners are or shall be admitted.
