

Political Effects of the Legislation of 1862.

We have already stated the effect of the legislation of 1861 upon the fortunes of the Republican party, as shown by the elections of that year. Let us now examine its influence—strengthened and reinforced as it was by the events of the session of 1862—upon the political contest which followed the close of the campaign.

The House Committee did find, as we have already stated, that the Tonnage Tax Law was procured by corrupt and illegal means, and that the officers of the Company had either evaded the process of the House or declined to testify. The House had previously reported the law by adverse vote.

The Speakers of both houses—one of whom was a candidate of the Company—were both taken.
