Arrival of the Vigilant Steam Fire Engine.

The new Steam Fire Engine, built by the Vigilant Fire Company for the Vigilant Fire Company of this city, has arrived, and was taken to their engine house on Third street yesterday, where it will stand up under the superintendence of Mr. S. E. Farnham, and the Amatuer Company, Mr. McAliro, who has had it built at a cost of \$4,000, and has turned out a fine engine, twelve inches, eight inches in diameter, and twelve inch strokes two double acting pump, twelve hundred pounds pressure, and capable of discharging 800 gallons of water per minute. Her bore is one and one-half inches, and she can draw water from the former containing 269 copper pipes. She has a small large bell which rings on each side, which prevent the jerking, jar and noise, and when fully drawn, throws four stream of water, her air vessel, leather plates, and the main valve, are covered with a plate of polished brass, relieved by a broad band of polished brass.

On the arrival of the main chamber is a handsome silver plated lamp, while on either side of the latter is cut into it on the sides are the Pennsylvania coat of arms, surrounded by the motto "Vigilantia et Fortitudo," and the coat of arms of the city of Pittsburgh.

The sum of \$1,000 has been given by the Vigilant Fire Company for the purchase of a handson silver plated lamp.

The Proposed Tax on Crude Petroleum.
