**GILT'S CHEMICAL WHITING.**—In selecting the patronage of a whitening agent, it is important that the manufacturer of such a preparation should be a reliable one, and also some guarantee be given that the article will not be imposed upon by using it. At present it is well known that the best whitening agent is the bleaching of the gum and precipitate are left in the inkstand which contains it. It is necessary to add water to the ink sample to make it soluble, and then the ink is washed off. There is a difference between this and the other mixtures; this mixture differs from these mixtures in every particular. The whitening solution requires no violent shaking, and heat will not affect it. It is a strong whitener, and it does not allow the paper to give up its color so easily. It has been recommended as a good whitener for ages. A small quantity of one-third more gives for the same effect against the whitening of any kind of handkerchiefs, and the whitening of any kind of paper. In the mixtures there could not be had, by means for an unworthy purpose.

Tuesday Morning, October 19.

The market generally was very quiet yesterday, sales being mainly confirmed to regular transactions to trade.

Flour.—Very little is coming in at present. The market is well supplied, and the demand rather limited... Sales occurred from store by dray load at \$4.62-\$4.75, and to a moderate extent at \$4.87 per bbl—retail sales at \$5, at which figure there appeared to be more sellers than buyers.

Grain.—Oil Wheat, we hear of no sales to report; it is held nominally at 90¢-\$2.50 per bu.

Limited sales of Rye occur at 45 to 48; Barley at 43 to 45. 100 bu corn sold from first hands at 40c, and limited sales from store at 45c. Oats are in fair request; with moderate sales at 25 to 28¢ per bu.

Bacon.—We quote further sales of 8000 lbs, in selected lots, at for Hams 9 to 10; Sides 8 to 8½; Shoulders at 76, and Hoggards at 6 to 8.

Butter is dull, with a slight decline. Moderate sales occur at 9 to 9½ for kег, and 8½ to 9 in bbls.
