These works, we need not say are famous for the manufacture of malleable iron, which is as comparatively little known as it is highly valuable. The first would be a more appropriate name for the establishment of Mesura. Livingston, Roggin & Co, to which we made a firing visit on Saturday. These works, we need not say, are famous for the manufacture of malleable iron, which is as comparatively little known as it is highly valuable. The first shape in which this kind of iron was made known to the public was in the shape of garden rakes and potato hoes. Beginning with these course implements, it has grown into favor, and its use has now been applied to all the varied purposes for which small iron is wanted.

The consumption of iron for their two cupols furnaces is two tons per day; and is formed into a variety of castings too numerous to repeat, though it is safe to say, none weigh over bulf a dozen pounds. After the castings come from the moulds, they are imade malleable by a most simple process, that may be thus described. The pieces are packed in aquare iron pots, with a mass of oxide of iron.

The pieces are pucked in aquare iron pots, with a mass of oxide of iron-these pieces are then placed in a furance, and exposed to a steady heat for a long time; and by the process become decarbonized—the action of heat upon the iron aided by the oxide of iron, having the same effect upon the castings as the puddling of iron, upon metal in preparation for blooming—the castings are then put into a large cylinder—eleaning and smoothing each other by friction—making hand work unnecessary, as in cleaning or dinary castings. They are then sorted and trimmed, ready to put together, in the shape of coffee mills, of which five hundred are made daily—thumb latches, door locks, counter scales, and the wide variety of saddlery hardware, from the bit in the horse's mouth, to the trace hoots that fasten him to the carriage.
