to the intense heat of a stone coal fire for more than
six hours. In one hour and a half the safe came
out hot, but still closed. After cooling, which was
done by the water which had been poured into
the balance of the time, until the iron plates were
partially melted off, the furnace was then thrown down,
and the safe cooled and opened. The money, papers,
books which it contained were as perfect as when
placed in the safe. The safe was also perfectly
purified by the water in cooling the safe. We have no
hesitation in recommending it to the public as a safe
superior to any we have ever seen tested, and believe
that it will stand any heat which might be produced
by a fire which would not be solid made.
