PHILADELPHIA MARKET.

Philadelphia, Nov. 6, 1842.

Flour—Market dull—Sales of 500 lbs Western at \$5.37 per cwt.

Corn—Meals—Sales of 1,000 barrels at former price.

Grain—Sales of 6,000 bushels white wheat at \$11.20, and pure red at \$11.15 per bushel.

Wheat—Sales of prime yellow at 67 to 68 cents per bushel.

Cot Corn—Market as last quoted, with sales of 200 bushels.

Rice—Sales at 121 cts per gallon.

No change in Groceries.

NEW YORK MARKET.

New York, Nov. 6, Noon.

Flour—The market is firm, with good eastern and home demand, and shipping inquiry.

Sales of flour at \$5.37 to \$5.43, and Western at \$5.45 to \$5.51, and of middlings at \$5.00 per cwt.

Grain—Sales of prime White Wheat at 125 cts, and of Western in New Orleans \$11.20 to 11.30 per bushel.

Corn—Sales mixed at 67 to 68 cts.

Wheat—Sales of 6,000 bushels white at \$11.20, and pure red at \$11.15 per bushel.

Provisions—Considerable dullness prevails in the provisions, but prices show very material change. Salt at 47 cents bacon sides, western at 45 cts & 1/2 per lb. Short ribs, regular sales of bacon at 14 to 14 1/2 cts per lb. Receipts are less abundant, but the market is fairly supplied.

Gulls—Sales of ham, and No 1 fat at 60 cts per cwt.

Fish—The market is abundantly supplied, with regular limited trade transactions at the following rates—Salmon \$10, mackerel \$10 1/2 to 2 1/2 cts per lb.; oysters \$5.50 to 6.50; herring 50 cts per lb., and cod fish at 4 to 50 cts per lb.

FRUIT—For green apples we find sales from stores at 70 to 71 cts per lb. in small quantities.

In hard we find very little doing, but may quote nominally at 7 to 7 1/2 cts per lb.

BUTTER—Sales of butter at \$1.60 to \$1.70 per lb.

CHEESE—continues in fair demand, with regular sales of cheddar at 67 to 68 cts per lb. Receipts are less abundant, but the market is fairly supplied.

GULS—Sales of ham, and No 1 fat at 60 cts per cwt.

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
