It is very desirable that some substitute for our present wooden fences should be found, and iron n some shape or other, appears to promise bet than any thing else. It should not be forgotten, in estimating the relative merits of wood and iron that the latter kind of fence must de straight; there by taking up much less room, and enabling the field clear of weeds. It is true that a wooden fence may be arraight; but they too seldom are, and onsidered, more expensive than wire.
