MURDER OF THOS. D'ARCY McGEE.

REAT EXCITEMENT IN THE DO-

Ottawa, Canada, April 7 .- At 21 o'clock this morning the Hon. D'Arcy McGee was for which it is recommended. shot dead by an unknown assassin, as he where he lodged, on Sparks s reet. The ball passed through his head and lodged in the door, which Mr. McGee was in the act of opening. A son of Mrs. Trotter, who is one of the Parliament pages, was returning home, and was some distance from the house when he heard the shot. On reaching his mother's door he found Mr. McGee dead on the pavement. He saw no person in the neighborhood and heard no footsteps. The night was bright and clear, and the assassin must have been either concealed behind the fence of a vacant lot opposite, or made a hasty retreat immediately on firing the shot. Mr. McGee had just left the Parliament House, and had a cigar in his mouth when he was killed. His brains exuded from the wound, and; the sidewalk was covered with his blood. This fact, in connection with that of the ball lodging in the door-post, seems to indicate that the weapon was held close to his head when fired. There have been, as yet no traces whatever of the assassin discovered. The Government of Canada offer \$5,000, Government of Ontario and Quebec \$5,000, and the Mayor of Ottawa \$4,000 reward for the apprehension of the guilty party. Business is almost entirely suspended, and Wm Geary flags are flying at half-mast.

Great crowds are in the streets. In the House last night, a couple of hours before the assassination, Mr. McGee delivered an able speech on the position of Nova Scotia. It is said to have been one of the most eloquent efforts of his life.

Oh Saturday evening Mr. McGee was present at the dinner given by Mr. Cock- James F Weaver burn, the Speaker of Parliament, and it was noticed that he was somewhat gloomy and reserved, his usual flow of liveliness and gayety lacking as if he had a sad premonition of the terrible fate about to befall him. The murder has created an intense feeling against Fenianism, although it is not known positively whether he was assassinated by the Irishmen or not.

The counsel for the President do not think the trial will continue beyond next Monday; it may end before that time.
