IMPORTANT TO SOLDIERS. - The State Legislature at Harrisburg recently passed a bill, which provides that the discharge papers of soldiers who in the Register's Office in each county. In this way the fact of having an honorable discharge from the service may be preserved by the soldier; but a copy of such county record according to existing rules, will not supply the place of the original discharge certificate in case of an application to the government for bounty, land, back pay, etc., in all such cases the certificate of dis charge itself must be produced to the proper authorities at Washington. Soldiers should remember this and carefully preserve their certificates of discharge from being lost or destroyed whether they be recorded in the office of the county recorder or not.
