## Does Grant Have "Snakes" in his

Since Grant has received the radi-

cal nomination, his supporters deny

that he is an intemperate man, which

is a charge they themselves made.

To settle the matter, we have him

tried in a Centre county court. Mr.

M'Allister who is a strong temperance

advocate and supporter of the great

drinker and smoker, appears for the

defendant, with witnesses from Grant's

own party as most likely to swear him

clear—the Democrats all being satis-

fied that Ulysses does take a drop of

the critter.

Mr. M'Allister calls the great radi-

cal leader, Wendell Phillips, upon the

stand, and tells him to state to the

court and jury what he knows about

Grant's having a hankering after

whiskey, and Phillips says:

"Imagine a Republican candidate

for the Presidency—the most popular

man in America—who cannot stand up

before a glass of liquor without falling

down."
