A DEER HUNT.  
A few months ago, when at Churchville,  
I casually mentioned that I had never  
witnessed a deer hunt. A party was immediately  
formed, and the names are as follows:  
Lieut. Gen. J. R. Zollicoffer, Lieut. Gen.  
J. S. Morgan, Hon. G. W. S. Broad Foot,  
J. S. H. Wetzel, the great Indian Hunter,  
and myself. The next morning after an  
early breakfast, we set out under the wise  
direction of Lieut. Gen. J. S. Morgan, the  
great deer hunter, and took the road lead-  
ing by Mr. Coker's iron works, Mr. Fil-

Broad Foot awoke first, went out, and mistook  
it for a deer, took aim, fired, and brought  
the mule to the ground; the report

an instant the mule hunter came in much  
excited, saying, "I shot a deer!" and to our  
surprise he had shot this poor mule's mule.  
We buried the mule. Afterwards I was  
permeated near a small stream, as we inter-  
ested making another chase before leaving  
for home. All was quiet, except the mule  
leaving up from the brook to the sur-  
face, and turning his silver side to the sun.  
I really heard a rustling among the dry  
leaves, and a large doe leaped from the  
thicket, passed near the place where I
