For the Reporter. FARM TALK.

Friend "Jab" proposed we shall this time talk about hens and pigs. Hens are considered by most folks, a kind of "military necessity," costing more than they profit. Without flattering the much abused "hen family," we shall show, that, at least, our hens, do pay; and we have no crack rreed, but such, as every body else has. We copy from our farm book :

apieve, but counting eggs in advance is not always safe; we lay the blame, however, to the shed in which they roost, it is not tight chough ; food we give as much as they wish to ent-shelled corn and warm bran-mash, but we forgot to lay in a store of lime and feb19,tf

One fault, we think, is in not beginning to fired early enough in the full, as soon as worms and grass-hoppers leave, we should commence feeding; a hen can't change corn into eggs in a day or a week, nor do they lay just when they please, but, as the eggs are finished so they are dropped, and to finish them material must be furnished. The manure is an important item, and to save it, trees are not the best places to roost on, better have a warm, dry, shed, with a good floor, so that you can leave it undisturbed till corn planting, nothing better to make corn grow, We doubt very much, whether any thing else on the farm pays as

good interest as a hen. "Jab" wants to know about pigs ; we are not chemist enough to know all about the 'heating'' nature of corn, but know practically that it makes pigs grow ; of course we feed plenty of milk, and that, we suppose, as fast as the corn heats; have milk feed corn, if not, why feed corn anyhow; corn was made for pigs; as a sub for milk, pour scalding water on bran, and when cool, feed; and withall keep dry and clean, and if your pigs are still pigs, next fall come to your loved Centre, and we'll show you hoge Dews-THE-VALLEY. show you hogs


