Stewart, Grant's Sec. of the Treasury, has resigned his seat in the cabinet.

It is almost certain that Boutwell, of Mass., will get Stewart's place, and this will necessitate the resignation of Hoar.

Grant has sent another message to the senate withdrawing his previous message in which he asked for the passage of a joint resolution to exempt from the provisions of the law of 1789.

The Pennsylvania radical congressmen have sent a petition to our state Legislature, for the passage of an act appropriating money for a statue of Thad. Stevens, to be placed in the Lincoln monument.

This would cost upwards of \$30,000. We object to this waste of money. 1026 Miles of the Union Pacific Railroad.

ARE NOW COMPLETED. As 634 miles of the western portion of the line, beginning at Sacramento, are also done, but 200 MILES REMAIN TO BE FINISHED.

To be finished, to Open the Grand Through Line to the Pacific. This Opening will certainly take place early this season.
