1026 Miles OF THE Union Pacific RAILROAD ARE NOW COMPLETED.

As 534 miles of the western portion of the line, beginning at Sacramento, are also done, but 200 MILES REMAIN.

To be finished, to Open the Grand Through Line to the Pacific. This Opening will certainly take place early this season.

Besides a donation from the Government of 12,800 acres of land per mile, the Company is entitled to a subsidy in U. S.
