Barbarous Proclamation of a Spanish Commander—Volunteer Difficulties—The Revolution Gaining Strength.

Key West, April 29.—The following important dispatch was received here, by mail, from Bayamo: Count Valmaseda, commander of the Spanish forces in the Eastern Department, has issued a proclamation, of which the following are the chief features: 1st. Every native male over fifteen years of age is to leave his residence within five days, and to be quartered in the barracks of the Eastern Department, where he will be furnished with arms and accoutrements. 2d. Every uninhabited dwelling where a white flag is undisputed, will be reduced to ashes. 3d. All women away from their homes will come to Bayamo or Jiquiri, or they will be brought by force. The proclamation is dated Bayamo, April fourth.

The Second Battalion of Volunteers, commanded by Colonel Zucilla, and forming the garrison of Fort Cabana in the harbor of Havana, having refused to obey an order for the release of a prisoner, General Duice and staff obliged them to proceed to the fort in full uniform to effect a change in their disposition. The Captain General made an address to the volunteers, when they suffered the prisoner to depart under escort of the Government troops. The action of the volunteers has occasioned great indignation on the part of the public, and threats were made against the Second Battalion in case they lay down their arms, which is not, however, anticipated.

The revolution in the Eastern Department is gaining strength. The Spanish troops in that portion of the island are suffering from sickness. The Cubans are besieging and constantly harassing them, and the capture of various convoys causes a scarcity of supplies and ammunition in the ranks.

FALL OF WHISKY.

Three Thousand Barrels Tumble from the Fifth Story of a Banded Warehouse—One Hundred Barrels Destroyed—Loss over Ten Thousand Dollars—Narrow Escape.

At about three o'clock yesterday afternoon a accident occurred at a banded warehouse in Birmingham, in which is stored a large amount of whisky belonging to Jos. Finch & Co., by which a loss of over ten thousand dollars was occasioned. It seems that in the fifth story of the building was stored a large amount of whisky in barrels, the immense weight of which caused the floor to give way, and the contents of the upper floor came crashing through to the next, carrying a thousand or more of barrels from that to the next, and so on to the bottom, where over three thousand barrels lay in a confused mass, over one hundred being entirely destroyed, involving a loss, in whiskey, of about ten thousand dollars, besides damages to the building amounting to several hundred dollars.

There were five men in the basement of the rear portion of the building, which, by the way, was the part that fell, and they made a narrow escape from being crushed to death. They heard the noise above them, and rushed out of the building just in time to save their lives, for in an instant after their departure the entire basement was filled with barrels of whisky which had fallen from the upper stories. The damage to the building is so extensive that all its contents will have to be removed in order to make repairs.—Pittsburgh Post.

John G. White, one of the pioneers of Phillipsburg, was found dead in his room on Monday. He occupied the second floor of a house on Front street. It appears that on Saturday he fell down the stairs leading to his room and sustained injuries—supposed at the time to be slight—which resulted in hemorrhage. Living alone, he was not discovered until Monday morning. When found his body was lying upon the floor, partially under the bed, which was saturated with blood. The coroner's jury rendered a verdict of accidental death from a fall, producing hemorrhage.—Journal.

Auckland, New Zealand, advises state that a terrible massacre had occurred at White Cliffs, Taranaki, on the fifth of February, during which Lieutenant Gascoyne, wife and family, and six settlers were killed outright. The settlers were coming into the town in a state of alarm.

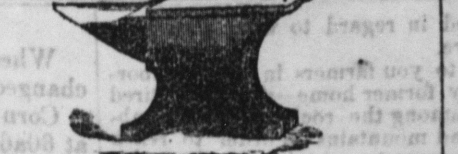
