## THE BOSTON JUBILEE.

The great Boston Peace Jubilee Festival opened the 14th inst., under auspicious circumstances. Immense crowds wended their way to the Coliseum, which is a vast structure, of imposing dimensions, with seats for 50,-000, and stage room for 20,000 more. The first day's performace commenced at 3 p. m., before an audience performers were on the stage, and the scene was one not to be easily forgot-

ten. A correspondent writes : "Through the kind attention of some whole structure, with all its appointments, and to witness the first rehearsal of the 'Ten Thousand.' The scene and the performance, was in the highest degree grand, and settled the question at once, that the whole affair was an assured success.
