WHO IS IT?

The Bellefonte National, radical, of last week, speaking of Geary's re-nomination, says that some of the radical leaders of Bellefonte—meaning those who did not favor Geary—are corrupt. The National says: "We again have the pleasant duty to perform of giving the support of the National to the election of a man, although not popular with some of the LEADING 'CORRUPT AND SCHEMING' politicians here."

Geary's Convention Makes an Open Declaration in Favor of Corruption.

ferred an amendment to this resolution, to come in at the end of it, in these words, "and pledging the Republicans of Pennsylvania to the retrenchment of public expenses and the reformation of abuses in the management of public affairs." This amendment was voted down, "rejected," as these proceedings say, because "it was not relevant to the subject."

There is considerable excitement at Mt. Vernon, Ohio, over the removal of Mrs. Hood, late postmaster of that city, and the appointment of Mr. Noah Boyton. Mrs. Hood is the widow of a soldier, and was appointed to the post-office about two years ago on account of her good character and the needs of herself and her orphans.

The great Boston Peace Jubilee Festival opened the 14th inst., under auspicious circumstances. Immense crowds wended their way to the Coliseum, which is a vast structure, of imposing dimensions, with seats for 50,000, and stage room for 20,000 more.

Resignation of Borie.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—The event of the day has been the resignation of Secretary Borie, of the Navy Department, and the appointment of George M. Robeson, of Camden, N. J. So sudden was the whole performance that it is clear everything had been arranged for some time. Grant prefers to have his appointments criticized after they have been installed in office. Borie's health and private business rendered the duties of the Navy Department onerous. Mr. Robeson, heretofore, like most of Grant's appointments, has lived in obscurity, so far as public life is concerned. He was born in 1829, in Belvidere, New Jersey.
