Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the town council of the borough of Bellefonte are hereby authorized and empowered to borrow, on the credit of said borough, for the purposes stated in said act, to which this is a supplement, the further sum of not exceeding fifty thousand dollars, at the same rate of interest and upon the same conditions provided for in said act; and the said town council and their successors in office are hereby further empowered to levy and collect such taxation, in addition to that now allowed by law, as may be necessary to pay the annual interest on the funded debt of said borough.
