The Death Of Edwin M. Stanton.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25. The announcement made early this norning that Edwin M. Stanton was dead startled the entire community and spread like wild-fire throughout the country. The report at first was discredited, but it was soon found to be true. He died at three o'clock this morning from heart disease. Surgeon General Barnes, Rev. Dr. Starkie and the wife, and family of the ex-Secretary were at his bedside an hour before his death. He was unconscious and speechles. Dr. Starkie administer ed the sacrament and performed the services of the Episcopal church. Mr-Stanton had been very feeble for several days, but no alarm was felt for his recovery. The President and Vice President called on him last Sunday his fifty four birth day, when the former tendered to him the appointment of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. There is a perceptible gloom prevailing among his large number of friends and admirers. He was a man of numerous enemies, but whatever their feeling may be this is not the proper time to speak of th m. The President, Cabinet, Senators, Representatives and other high officials called at his late residence and condoled with the bereaved family.

PROPERLY OVERSLAUGHED. When Mr. Fox, a member of the Democratic party, and a Representative in Congress from New York offered a resolution to appoint a special committee to investigate the gold gammojority in Congress by saving that Representative Fox, whose district in cludes Wall street has made himself conspicuous by his efforts to have select committee of investigation appointed, but his resolution bearing direct animus towards General Grant Thursday. he was very properly overslaughed by the majority. It is rather late in the day to make the President responsible for the vagaries of his brothers-in law. The matter was amended by another resolution, emanating from Mr. Schenck, directing the Committee on Banking and Currency to make the investigation, and clothing them with the necessary powers. We doubt if anything new will be developed or if any result will be attained which will punish the conspirators or prevent a

recurrence of similar conspiracies. Precisely, Mr. Fox proposed an investigation. Mr. Schenck proposed to smother the matter over, and prevent the truth of the matter from coming to light. The animus of Mr. Fox's resolution was against all parties who had any hand in the transaction, whether it be Grant, Fisk or Corbin. Why are Grant's friends afraid of the investigation? It only confirms and makes stronger the supicion that the administration did have a hand in the Wall street matter.

The fact is, there are too many high officials mixed up in the matter, to allow a fair investigation. Every attempt to sift the matter thoroughlywill be "properly overslaughed," as the Herald expresses it. - Post.

The Superintendent of Indian Affairs for New Mexico forwards to the Indian office a report of the condition of the Mescalora Apache Indians, in in which it is stated they are still on the war path.

AN INDIAN FIGHT.

On the night of November 13th. party of twenty of them took about hundred head of cattle from a man living twenty miles east of Fort Stanton, on the the Rio Hondo, The commanding officer at Fort Stanton sent Lieutenant Cushing and a detachment Third Cavalry, in pursuit of them. The cavalry followed their trail over a rough and broken country, and overtook the Indians in a canon on the north side of the Guadaloupe Moun-Stanton, and at noon on the 18th attacked them. After fighting three hours, Lieutenant Cushing completely routed the Indians and captured about forty head of stolen stock, and twentysix horses and mules belonging to the savages. The number of Indians engaged in the fight was estimated at about one hundred, and the number killed and wounded fifteen. abandoned their ; property during the fight and took to the rocks on the side Neuvitas and guarded the railroad of the canon. The rocks were upwards of a thousand feet high, and the trail was very difficult to follow, the Indians frequently dividing into small parties and scattering over the country to conceal their trail. Lieutenant Cushing travelled at least one hundred and twenty miles in pursuit, without water
