Ecumenical or General Catholic

Councils.

1. The first General Council was that of Nice, held in 325 for the purpose of refuting the heresies of Arius who asserted that Christ was inferior to His Father.

2. The second General Council was held at Constantinople in 381, to refute the errors of Macedonius, who asserted that the Holy Ghost was not one of the divine persons.

3. The third General Council was held at Ephesus in 431, concerning the heresy of Nestorius, who asserted that the Blessed Virgin should not be called the Mother of God.

4. The fourth General Council met at Chalcedon in 451, to decide on the doctrine of Eutyches, who denied the humanity of Christ.

5. The fifth General Council was held at Constantinople in 553. It condemned the heresy of Origen, who asserted that the Holy Ghost is nothing more than divine energy or power of acting, etc.

6. The sixth General Council met at Constantinople in 680; it condemned the doctrine of the Monothelites.

7. The seventh met at Nice in 787, to denounce the impiety and heresy of the Iconoclasts, who opposed veneration of images.

8. The eighth General Council met at Constantinople in 869, and confirmed the reverence of images, and other regulations of the church.

9. The ninth General Council and the first Lateran met in 1123.

10. The tenth General Council, the second Lateran met in 1139.

This Council, among other matters, condemned the acts of Arnold of Brescia.

11. The eleventh General Council also met in the Lateran in 1179. This Council ordained that the right of voting for a new Pontiff should from that time forward belong exclusively to the College of Cardinals.

12. The twelfth also met in the Lateran in 1215. This Council, among other matters, gave its assent to seventy chapters drawn up by the Pope who presided at it.

13. The thirteenth met at Lyons in 1245. Its object was that of deposing the Emperor Frederick. It also treated of three other subjects:—1st. The assisting of the Empire of Constantinople against the Tartars; and 2d. The Holy Land against the Saracens.

14. The fourteenth met at Lyons in 1274, for the purpose, among other things, of returning the Greek Church.

15. The fifteenth met at Vienna in 1311 for the purpose of suppressing the Order of Knights Templars, and the doctrine of the "Brethren and Sisters of the Free Spirit," a German institution condemned.

16. The sixteenth was that of Constance, which assembled in 1414, on account of a dispute, that existed in the selection of a Pope, there being at that time no less than three claimants for the holy office.

17. The seventeenth is known as that of Ferrara and Florence. Its object was the reunion of the Latin and Greek Churches.

18. The eighteenth was the Council of Trent, which was convoked in 1545, by Pope Paul III. to refute the heresies of Luther, Calvin, and Zuinglius.

19. The nineteenth General Council commenced at Rome December 18, 1869.

AN ACT to incorporate the Spring Creek Fish Company.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, that the following be and they are hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That D. B. Bush, S. T. Shugart, F. P. Green, C. T. Atwood, J. M. Howell, J. A. Hackenback and R. H. Foster, of the county of Centre, and those who shall become stockholders in the company hereinbefore named, be and they are hereby incorporated in a body politic and corporate, with the rights, privileges and franchises of a corporation, by the name, style and title of the Spring Creek Fish Company, for the purpose of raising, curing and selling fish, and of any other business connected with the raising, curing and sale of fish, on or near the waters of Spring creek, in the county of Centre; and for that purpose shall have the right to hold and enjoy, by purchase or lease, or otherwise, any lands, buildings, and other premises, and to erect, maintain and use, in operation such sluices, dams, inlets and reservoirs, and buildings as may be necessary, and the same to lease or sell as they may deem proper.

Section 2. That the capital stock of said company shall be ten thousand dollars, in shares of ten dollars each, to be issued to the subscribers in proportion to the number of shares subscribed by each, and the said capital stock may be increased or diminished as the board of directors may determine.

Section 3. That if any person shall willfully destroy or injure any dam, inlet, sluice or reservoir, or shall in any manner corrupt the waters of any sluice, inlet or reservoir, whereby the spawn of fish therein may be destroyed or destroyed, or fish in the ponds or reservoirs, and shall take fish from the same, or shall do and commit injury to the buildings or trees upon the grounds of said company, or shall be guilty of any offense, or conviction therefor in the court of quarter sessions of Centre county, or shall be so offending shall be fined by said court, in a sum not less than fifty dollars nor more than one thousand dollars, or shall undergo an imprisonment in the county jail for not less than ten days or more than six months, or both, or either, at the discretion of the court.

Section 4. That the corporations above named shall, at the call of any three or more of their number, or five days notice shall be given to each of them, assemble at the Bush house, in Bellefonte, on a day and at a place fixed for that purpose, and then and there organize the said company by electing one of their number president, and one secretary and treasurer; and the said corporations shall form a board of directors to manage the affairs of said company for one year thereafter.

Section 5. That it shall be the duty of the secretary and treasurer to keep books of subscription to the capital stock of said company, and to certify the amount of stock as provided in the by-laws.

Section 6. That the directors of said company may from time to time enact such by-laws, rules and regulations as may be necessary for the management of said company, not inconsistent with the constitution and laws of this Commonwealth.

Section 7. That the Secretary of the House of Representatives, JOHN CLARK, and the Speaker of the Senate, JAMES W. WATKINS, be and they are hereby appointed, to execute this act.
