TAKING A BABYS' CRADLE FOR RENT-THE CONSEQUENCE.S-An Irishwoman has recently been tried in the north of England for the homicide of a Deputy Sheriff. The officer entered her house to distrain for rent which had not been paid, and finding nothing else of value, said he must have the cradle in which a baby was sleeping. The woman naturally refused to let him take it. He insisted, and the altercation between them, thus begun, was brought to a climax by the bailiff, who turned the baby out of the cradle, which he passed to an andebailiff standing at the door. The exasperated mother seized the first offensive weapon at hand, which was, as it happened, a rolling-pin. With this she struck the officer two heavy blows on the head, and as he retreated, she flu g an earthenware jug at him. This was broken to pieces over his head. From the effects of injuries thus received, the bailiff died after an illness of six days. The poor woman was arrested. tried and found guilty of homicide by the jury, with a recommendation to mercy. The judge heartily acted on the recommendation and discharged the woman to keep the peace. In the course of the trial, the court said, "that the distraint of the cradle was quite illegal, and being so, the woman used no more force than was necessary to resist it; a bailiff might as well distrain a shirt upon a person's back, as a cradle with a child in it. Even a horse upon which a man is riding cannot legally be distrained, much less a baby's cradle in which the baby

A Horrible Confession.
