Struck by lightning! How often do we hear this sad news? Barn burnt, houses damaged, and persons killed, all of which might be avoided if people did their duty in protecting themselves against the electric current, by the inventions of scientific men, who have given it to us now to rest secure against lightning, by having our buildings rodded. There is no instance upon record of a building having been damaged by lightning which had been properly protected by a good rod. Only last week, Rev. Fisher's barn, in Gregg township, was destroyed by fire, the effects of lightning—the barn not having a rod. While at the same time Mr. Wm. Emerick's house, which was also struck, would undoubtedly have shared the same fate, but having a rod, the electricity was thereby conducted into the ground, and no damage done. BARN STRUCK BY LIGHTNING AND BURNED.—On last Thursday night, 19th, about 2 o'clock, a most terrific thunder storm passed over our valley, during which the barn upon the farm of Rev. P. S. Fisher, in Gregg township, was struck by lightning, and in a moment thereafter the whole building was in a blaze. The light of the burning barn was reflected upon our town, although about five miles distant, and we witnessed it from the windows of our bed-chamber. The barn, in a very short time was in ashes with most of its contents, including four horses, property of Mr. Isaac Reish, the tenant, who also lost all his horse-gears, he barely having time to save his reaper and buggy. Some 200 bushels of grain, and several tons of hay were burned. Rev. Fisher had an insurance of \$800 upon the barn, in the Centre Hall Co., and \$200 insurance upon the grain. Mr. Reish had no insurance, and being a man of moderate means his loss is a severe one for him. The barn was nearly new, having been built some five years ago.

SEVERE FALL.—On last Tuesday night, about 9 o'clock, as Rev. J. K. Miller, of this place, was about to return home from Mr. Geo. Harpster's in attempting to pass through the new house of the latter, fell through the joists from the first floor into the cellar, he being under the impression that the same were covered with boards. In falling his arm struck a heavy sledge bringing it along down; the hammer struck him over the right eye, knocking him senseless, and causing severe bruises about the eye and on his cheek below. Persons in an adjoining out-building hearing him fall, immediately came to his assistance, and accompanied him home. Mr. Miller feels the effects of the fall severely and the right side of his face presents a very black and bruised appearance.
